DONALD EWER was a Korda scholar at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London before emigrating to Canada in 1954, where he played five years in major roles at the Stratford Shakespeare Festival, and in over 150 radio and TV shows. A veteran of 25 years, he appeared off-Broadway in BILLY LIAR and in SAVED, for which he won an Obie award in 1970. Broadway credits include ALFIE and UNDER MILK WOOD. He was on "The Ed Sullivan Show" and in the national tours of GIRL IN MY SOUP, THE CARETAKER and HADRIAN VII. He has played major roles at A.C.T. in San Francisco, and recently was at the Arena Stage in Washington, D.C., in IN CELEBRATION playing Mr. Shaw, the role he is recreating here at ACT.

JOHN GILBERT recently appeared as Mitch in A STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE at ACT. He started his acting career at the University of Washington School of Drama in 1957. At ACT his credits include THE HOT L BALTIMORE, A CONFLICT OF INTEREST, LUV and THE CAUCASIAN CHALK CIRCLE. Among his appearances at the Seattle Repertory Theatre were roles in HAMLET, LONG DAY'S JOURNEY INTO NIGHT and THE REHEARSAL. He has also worked at Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park and the American Theatre Company in Portland.

STEVEN GILBORN last appeared at ACT in 1971 in HADRIAN VII, THE BOYS IN THE BAND and THE NIGHT THOREAU SPENT IN JAIL. He just finished Moe Axelrod in Clifford Odet's AWAKE AND SING at the Loeb Drama Center in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He has appeared at the Missouri Repertory Theatre as Jamie Tyrone in LONG DAY'S JOURNEY INTO NIGHT and Thomas Becket in MURDER IN THE CATHEDRAL. Last season he played Pete in David E. Freeman's CREEPS at the American premiere at the Folger Theatre Group in Washington, D.C., and subsequently in New York. He then went to the New York Shakespeare Festival at Lincoln Center to understudy in THE TEMPEST and MACBETH.

GARDNER HAYES was in ACT's recent production of A STREETCAR NAMED DESIRE. He has appeared in GREASE on Broadway and in EVERYMAN off-Broadway at the Lincoln Center Library and Museum. He has played at the Actors' Theatre of Louisville and at the Long Wharf Theatre in Connecticut. Summer stock productions include CARNIVAL, ANYTHING GOES, BYE, BYE BIRDIE, THE IMPORTANCE OF BEING EARNEST, KING LEAR and ITALIAN STRAW HAT. He is a graduate of the Yale School of Drama.

JAMES HIGGINS has appeared at ACT this season in COUNT DRACULA and TWIGS. Previous ACT credits include THE CONTRACTOR, OLD TIMES, THE LION IN WINTER, THE ROYAL HUNT OF THE SUN and BLACK COMEDY. He was born and educated in England, and on graduation from Cambridge University was awarded a Mellon Fellowship for graduate study at Yale University. He was Artist-in-Residence and Associate Director of Theatre at Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri for eight years. His Broadway credits include THE ZULU AND THE ZAYDA, and off-Broadway productions of THE MAGISTRATE and THE GOOD SOLDIER SCHWEIK. He was a member of the original company of the Seattle Repertory Theatre.

MARJORIE NELSON was a member of the original company of the Seattle Repertory Theatre where she appeared for several seasons. Her last role at ACT was Sadie in the premiere production of CRABDANCE in 1969. She is founder of the Port Townsend Festival Theatre where she has produced, directed and acted. She played Mother Courage at the Frederick Wood Theatre in Vancouver, B.C., has appeared on- and off-Broadway, in films and television and in many professional productions in Hollywood. She has taught at acting schools in Seattle, Hollywood and New York, and is a qualified teacher of the Alexander Technique.

MAUREEN QUINN, a native of Dublin, Ireland, last appeared at ACT in 1971 in A CRY OF PLAYERS. She previously played at ACT in RHINOCEROS, INADMISSABLE EVIDENCE, MARAT/SADE and PHILADELPHIA, HERE I COME. She was a member of the Seattle Repertory Theatre for five seasons, appearing in 25 productions there including THE HOSTAGE, LYSISTRATA, THE IMAGINARY INVALID, VOLPONE, JUNO AND THE PAYCOCK, HENRY IV PART I, THE CRUCIBLE and YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU. In New York she has been seen in THE PLOUGH AND THE STARS

with the Repertory Theatre of Lincoln Center and off-Broadway in SHADOW OF A GUNMAN. Most recently she appeared at the Hartford Stage Company in A TOUCH OF THE POET and OLD TIMES. She is married to actor Bernard Frawley and they have a daughter Oona.

Director, ROBERT LOPER. Mr. Loper is a faculty member of the University of Washington School of Drama and is well-known to Seattle audiences both as director and actor, through ACT, the Seattle Repertory Theatre and the School of Drama. At ACT he directed THE COLE PORTER REVUE, OLD TIMES, THE BOYS IN THE BAND, ENDGAME, THE HOMECOMING, BLACK COMEDY, AFTER THE FALL and the off-season production of Dylan Thomas' UNDER MILK WOOD. Among the shows he directed for the Seattle Repertory Theatre are THREE MEN ON A HORSE, THE PRICE and AND MISS REARDON DRINKS A LITTLE. In 1972 he directed UNCLE VANYA at the Bread Loaf Summer Theatre in Vermont. He directed FORGET-ME-NOT-LANE at the University of Washington earlier this summer, and recently David Wagoner's AN EYE FOR AN EYE FOR AN EYE.
