### **The Company**

THOMAS HILL (Billy Bishop) appeared at ACT in 1976 as "Nick" in The Time of Your Life, and he directed our productions of A Thurber Carnival in 1966 and The Great Divide in 1967. He was a member of the original Seattle Repertory Theatre company, where he both directed and acted, and recently appeared there as "Sid Davis" in Ah, Wilderness! His other Rep credits include "Willy Loman" in Death of a Salesman and the title roles in King Lear and Galileo. Among his Broadway credits are The Shadow Box and Sly Fox. He has appeared with the Manitoba Theatre Centre, Yale Repertory Theatre, Arena Stage, Cleveland Playhouse, and other major regional theatres, and has appeared in numerous films, most recently The Postman Always Ring Twice and True Confessions. Mr. Hill has served on the faculties of Yale University, Carnegie-Mellon University, and the University of Washington.

DAVID COLACCI (Piano Player) appeared on the ACT mainstage as "Charles Lang" in *The Water Engine* and, for two years, played "Fezziwig" in *A Christmas Carol*. He is a three-year veteran of The Young ACT Company, playing major roles in *The Odyssey, The Forgotten Door*, and *A Wrinkle in Time*. Recently David played "Feste" in *Twelfth Night* and "Hughes" in the world premiere of *Back to Back* at The Empty Space Theatre. His other area credits include *Fiddler on the Roof, South Pacific*, and *The Odd Couple* at the Cirque Theatre Restaurant.

DIRECTOR ROBERT LOPER is a veteran of many seasons at ACT. His directing credits include Buried Child last season, Otherwise Engaged in 1979, The Shad Box in 1978, as well as our productions of In Celebration, Of Mice and Men, The Cole Porter Revue, Old Times, The Boys in the Band, Under Milk Wood, and Desire Under the Elms. Mr. Loper also is well known as a director and actor with The Seattle Repertory Theatre, The Empty Space, and the Oregon Shakespearean Festival where his production of Death of a Salesman currently is running. He is a member of the faculty of the School of Drama at the University of Washington.

PLAYWRIGHT & COMPOSER JOHN GRAY is a native of Nova Scotia and trained as a director at the University of British Columbia, where he received his M.A. in 1971. He has directed more than sixty productions and composed music for at least twenty more. His scripts and scores for Billy Bishop Goes to War and another musical, 18 Wheels, both were Chalmers Award finalists and have made him one of Canada's top-grossing playwrights. newest musical, Rock and Roll, was duced in Ottawa earlier this year.

ERIC PETERSON collaborated with John Gray to create the character of Billy Bishop. Peterson, a native of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, is one of Canada's leading actors. He was chosen best actor of the 1979-80 season by the Toronto Globe & Mail and, in New York, won the 1980 Clarence Derwent Award for his performance as Bishop.

SET DESIGNER SCOTT WELDIN received his M.F.A. in design from the University of Washington. In addition to his ign for Getting Out this season, his work was seen on our mainstage for Buried Child and Artichoke last season and for Otherwise Engaged the previous year. Scott has designed for Conservatory Theatre Company, Poncho Theatre, The Cirque, and The Empty Space, and he is now Designer and Technical Director for the Drama Department of Seattle University. His many honors include a First Prize in Theatre Crafts Magazine's "Innovative Technical Theatre Practices Competition."

COSTUME DESIGNER NANROSE BUCHMAN designed our production of Getting Out this season. She spent two seasons as resident designer for the Alaska Repertory Theatre and recently returned there to design On Golden Pond. She designed Bingo, Boseman and Lena and Vanities for The Seattle Rep's 2nd Stage and was their assistant costume designer in 1976-77. Nanrose has also designed for Intiman, The Empty Space, and the Palace Theatre. In New York, she designed The ange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde at Cafe La Mama. She also served as assistant to the set designer for the PBS television series Decades of Decisions.

LIGHTING DESIGNER DONNA GROUT is a graduate of the University of Washington School of Drama. Her lighting design credits include *The Primary English Class, Getting Out, Medal of Honor Rag,* and *The Price* for The Group's 1980-81 season at the Ethnic Cultural Theatre.

While at ACT, she has designed *Buried Child*, A *Wrinkle in Time* and two productions of *Seattle Eclectic*. Donna is at present serving a second season as ACT's assistant lighting designer.

TECHNICAL DIRECTOR PHIL SCHERMER is also ACT's Production Manager. In the past sixteen years, Phil's lighting designs have included Custer, Catholics, Wings, Fanshen, The Water Engine, A Christmas Carol, The Club, The Shadow Box and many others. At The Empty Space, his lighting was seen in American Buffalo, A Prayer For My Daughter, Heat and Dusa, Stas, Fish and Vi. He has designed lighting for The Seattle Rep and its 2nd Stage as well, plus sets for ACT's productions of Fire! and Butterflies Are Free.

WEHOLT came to ACT in 1971 as an apprentice. Since then he has stage-managed and acted in several productions here, including Plaza Suite, Makassar Reef, The Water Engine, and the first Young ACT Company tour of the western United States. He appeared in productions of Loot, Macbeth, and Three Sisters at the University of Washington, from which he graduated cum laude with a degree in playwriting and literature. Michael also appeared in Cabaret and The Lover at Western Washington State College.
