The Company

R. A. FARRELL (Chuck Hart) played "Oliver" in our season opener. Da, and last season appeared in Custer. Loose Ends, and Whose Life Is It Anyway? For three years he has performed as "Marley's Ghost/Old Joe" in A Christmas Carol; toured twice with The Young ACT Company; and also appeared in Fanshen. With The Seattle Rep, R. A.'s credits include Strider. Salvation Now, and American Dreams, Lost and Found. At Intiman, he performed in Othello and The Lady's Not For Burning; plus Zastrozzi at The Empty Space; and Desire Under the Elms at Tacoma Actors Guild. He has worked with The Oregon Shakespearean Festival and with other regional theatres around the country as well.

JOHN GILBERT (Holly Crawford) has worked at ACT many times since he appeared in our 1966 production of In White America. A Seattle actor for 25 years, he studied at the U.W. School of Drama and first worked for Gregory Falls in *The Zoo Story* at the Showboat Theatre. His favorite ACT plays include The Caucasian Chalk Circle, Luv. In Celebration, A Streetcar Named Desire, and of course A Christmas Carol in which he has played "Scrooge" for the past six years. John appeared at Intiman in Uncle Vanya, Hedda Gabler, Pirandello's Henry IV, The Loves of Cass Maguire, Tartuffe, and Damien; and also has worked with The Empty Space, Poncho Theatre, the Montana Repertory Theatre, The American Theatre Company in Portland, and The Seattle Rep.

ANDREW JOHNS (George Herrick) is the author of Fridays; it is his first produced play and will go to Broadway this fall. As an actor, he was in the original cast of Peter Ustinov's The Unknown Soldier And His Wife and male standby for David Storey's Home, both on Broadway. In regional theatre, he has appeared as "Pizzaro" in Royal Hunt of the Sun, "Father" in I Never Sang For My Father, the title role in Rip Van Winkle, and others. Two of his other plays, Countertalk and Today's Special, were presented at The Milwaukee Rep's second stage this season and another, Pigeons On The Walk, was premiered recently at the Dallas Theatre Center.

KATHRYN MESNEY (Gail Herrick) appeared in Da as "Mrs. Prynne." She has acted and taught acting in both New York and Los Angeles, and is now a Seattle resident. She appeared in three plays-in-process at The Seattle Rep, An Ounce of Prevention, Salvation Now, and American Dreams, Lost and Found, as well as in Dance of Death. Her other credits include "Gisele" in Bonjour La Bonjour at The Empty Space, "Annie Sullivan" in The Miracle Worker at Poncho, "Emily Brent" in Ten Little Indians at Tacoma Actors Guild, and "Mrs. Webb" in Our Town at Snoqualmie Falls Forest Theatre. Kathryn heads the theatre vocal training program at Cornish Institute and is a member of None of the Above.


URSULA MEYER (Kay Strong) made her ACT mainstage debut as "The Yellow Peril" in Da and was a member of the 1982 Young ACT Company. She is a graduate of the U.W.'s Professional Actors Training Program and in the past year has worked with Conservatory Theatre Company, the Women's Theatre, and as an understudy for The Seattle Repertory Theatre. Ursula also appeared as "Cha Cha'' in Skid Road Theatre's production of Grease. She spent three summers with the Colorado, Illinois, and Idaho Shakespeare Festivals, performing such roles as "Juliet," "Rosalind," and the "Fool" in King Lear.

ALLEN NAUSE (Douglas Herrick) has appeared several times on our mainstage, including his role as "Charlie Now" in Da; plus performances last season in Custer, Loose Ends, and Whose Life Is It Anyway?; and previously in Man and Superman, Otherwise Engaged, and Holy Ghosts. Allen has worked with most major

theatres in our area, with credits that include "Eddie Brock" in Born Yesterday at The Seattle Rep, The Rose Tattoo and The Cherry Orchard at Intiman, Landscape of the Body and the world premiere of Oregon Gothic at The Empty Space, and Diamond Studs at Tacoma Actors Guild. Allen's film work includes The Runner Stumbles and Francis.

LYN TYRRELL (Virginia Herrick) made her first appearance at ACT as "Mother" in Da. She is familiar to Northwest audiences for her work in such roles as "Mother Superior" in Agnes of God at The Empty Space and "Myra Bruhl" in Deathtrap at the Tacoma Actors Guild. She also appeared in Pioneer Square Theatre's presentations of Suicide in Bb and Home Again, Kathleen. Lyn was part of the Montana Repertory Theatre Company's 1981 eight-state tour, appearing as "Eleanor of Aquitaine" in Lion In Winter and "Catherine Petkoff" in Arms and the Man.

DIRECTOR CLAYTON CORZATTE has just returned from Actors Theatre of Louisville, where he played the title



role in Billy Bishop Goes to War. Last season he directed our production of Whose Life Is It Anyway? Clayton has performed with some of America's leading theatre companies, including numerous times at ACT. In New York City during the 1960's he played major roles with the APA-Phoenix Repertory Company, during which time he won an Obie Award and was nominated for a Tony. He has directed productions in all the major Northwest theatres and ACT audiences have seen his productions of Holy Ghosts, Butterflies Are Free, and The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie. He and Susan Ludlow, his wife, also are the creators of Antic Diversions and recently appeared together in The Seattle Rep's presentation of Bedroom Farce.

SCENIC DESIGNER THOMAS M. FICHTER just recently designed five musicals for the Summer Music Theatre in Daytona Beach, Florida, for his second season there. Prior to moving to Seattle two years ago. Thomas lived in the Southeast and in New York City, where he assisted designer Eldon Elder. He received his B.A. from Stetson University and an M.F.A. from the University of Georgia. He currently is the scenic design artisan at The Seattle Rep and has designed several of their "Other Season" productions, including An Ounce of Prevention, The Grass Widow, and Wild Air. He also has been a design consultant for Pacific Northwest Ballet's Swan Lake.

COSTUME DESIGNER SHAY CUNLIFFE is marking her first Northwest production with *Fridays*. She usually is based in New York City, where she has designed new plays and dance pieces for La Mama, St. Clement's, The Open Space, and Theatre

for the New City. She was resident designer at the Manhattan School of Music's Opera Theatre in 1981-82. Shay received a degree in drama at the University of Bristol in England and later completed her studies in costume design at Lester Polakov's Studio in New York.

LIGHTING DESIGNER JODY **BRIGGS** is ACT's assistant technical director. His many credits here at ACT include Da, last season's productions of Getting Out and Whose Life Is It Anyway?, and previously For Colored Girls..., Holy Ghosts, Man and Superman, Henry IV Part 1, Absurd Person Singular, Your Own Thing, The Indian Experience, and You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown. Jody holds a master's degree from the U.W. and a B.F.A. from Boston University. He has designed sets and lighting for more than 75 theatre productions, musicals and dance performances in stock and regional theatres across the U.S. and Canada.

STAGE MANAGER MICHAEL WEHOLT came to ACT in 1971 as an apprentice. Since then he has stagemanaged numerous productions, including Makassar Reef and For Colored Girls..., and acted in several others, including Plaza Suite and The Water Engine. He also stage-managed the first Young ACT Company tour of the western United States. He appeared in productions of Loot, Macbeth, and Three Sisters at the University of Washington, from which he graduated cum laude with a degree in playwriting and literature. This fall, Michael will enter the Playwrights Workshop at the University of Iowa.

PRODUCING DIRECTOR GREGORY A. FALLS is the founder of A Contemporary Theatre. He has directed more than 50 productions here, including Catholics, Getting Out, Fanshen, Henry IV Part 1, and Ballymurphy. He also created five original children's theatre revues and three Christmas shows, plus a scripted version of *The Odyssey* with playwright Kurt Beattie and original scripts of The Forgotten Door, A Wrinkle In Time. The Pushcart War, and Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves. For ten years, Mr. Falls was Executive Director of the U.W. School of Drama. He is past president of the National Theatre Conference and the Washington Association of Theatre Artists, a founding board member of the United Arts Council of Puget Sound, and founder of the Champlain Shakespeare Festival.






