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
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
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Next at ACT

Mrs. California by Doris Baizley June 9-July 3

n Mrs. California, ACT's next production, playwright Doris Baizley has taken a "socio-comic" look at pre-feminism in the 1950s. A long-running Los Angeles hit, Mrs. California is a brightly satiric comedy that takes place at a 1955 homemakers' contest in a Los Angeles hotel. The winner will embody the epitome of the 1950s ideal woman: "a happy, good and beautiful homemaker."

The play will be directed by Lee Shallat — a former Seattle actress who made her professional debut in ACT's presentation of *The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds* in 1972. She is now a successful and prolific director of stage and screen in California. Among her television credits are the popular "Family Ties" and "Newhart."

Mrs. California deftly satirizes the plight of the 1950s housewife by placing her in the Mrs. California homemakers' contest. And as funny as the contest scenes are, the play also seriously considers the role of women at that time. In an interview with Evening Outlook, Baizley discusses the year 1955: "There was a whole set of social institutions that taught people to conform, and they were as constricting for men as they were for women. Women felt they belonged at home, and men felt they had to get ahead in business. No one asked questions."

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The evolution of *Merrily*

A continuing story

ccording to Craig Zadan, in his exhaustive, authoritative survey of Stephen Sondheim's career, Sondheim and Co., the idea of musicalizing George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart's Merrily We Roll Along belonged to director-producer Harold Prince. Prince's wife had been urging him to do a show with and about kids for some time, when he remembered the 1934 play, which had been one of his earliest theatre-going experiences. Prince was attracted to Kaufman and Hart's examination of a friendship that fails to endure over the years and to their narrative structure that moved backwards in time, ending with the play's protagonist at the beginning of his life, full of ideals and great expectations.

Prince contacted Sondheim and playwright George Furth, his collaborators on the groundbreaking musical Company, who eagerly agreed to participate in the project. The playwright hero and his best friend — an artist in the original play — become a composer, Frank Shepard, and a lyricist, Charley Kringas, whose 25-year friendship is sacrificed to Frank's allconsuming obsession with success. The backwards story-telling was retained and, with a large cast of talented unknowns (most of them barely out of their teens), Merrily We Roll Along opened on November 16, 1981 at New York's Alvin Theatre — and flopped. Prince and his partners were totally taken aback by the disastrous critical reception which roundly condemned the entire production; they were convinced that in Merrily they had created something refreshingly special.

There had been a few harbingers of what was to come during a troubled preview period. The original leading man was judged to be inadequate and was replaced. Ron Field, who had been responsible for the exciting choreography on an earlier Hal Prince show, *Cabaret*, quit, complaining that the show's backwards structure was hopelessly confusing. The original costume designs were scrapped and replaced with t-shirts that had each character's name or relationship to the hero inscribed on its front.

And yet, despite these problems, there persisted a belief that *Merrily* would triumph.


I was visiting New York while Merrily was in previews and saw the show shortly before it opened. To be honest, my response to what I saw was mixed. The sets and costumes were certainly as unsuccessful as legend reports. And, I found it faintly distasteful to watch such young performers attempting to embody Franklin Shepard's parasitic hangers-on in the early scenes of the musical. But, as the story moved back in time, and the actors and the characters they portrayed grew closer in age, I found myself more and more engaged by the story and ultimately, very moved by the characters' youthful ardor and hopes. And Sondheim's score was terrific. The fault, as I saw it, lay with the production, rather than the material.

Several years after the show's failure on Broadway, George Furth sent the script to James Lapine, who was just about to begin work on his first Pulitzer Prize-winning collaboration with Sondheim, Sunday in the Park with George. Lapine was very impressed with Merrily and, after completing work on Sunday, joined Furth and Sondheim in a major reconsideration of the musical. The book of Merrily was substantially re-written to round out the character of Frank, whom many had found simply odious. Several new songs were added, and others reworked. The original opening and closing — a pair of graduation scenes that framed the story - were dropped. And, with an invitation to present the new version as part of the adventurous La Jolla Playhouse's 1985 season, a crucial decision was made: to cast this production with older, more experienced performers who would be able to explore the depths of characterization which had eluded the original cast. The show was much more enthusiastically received, but, at least as far as George Furth was concerned, there was still work to be done. George is a perfectionist and his attempts to rewrite the script amounted to something like an obsession. So, when Randy West, the enthusiastic director of a Phoenix,

Arizona community theater, approached him for permission to stage the La Jolla version, Furth said "no." But, he quickly added, if West was willing to fly him out for the rehearsal period and allow him to continue working on the show, Furth would be willing to reconsider.

I first heard about the Phoenix production while attempting to secure the rights for ACT to do the La Jolla script. In the six years since seeing the show, I, too, had become obsessed with Merrily. I had worn out my copy of the original cast album. And last fall while driving across country after having directed in Chicago, I found myself listening to a cassette tape of the show, and weeping (somewhere in Wyoming) as the young cast sang of their time coming through. As the 20th anniversary of my graduation from high school drew near, I was inclined to brood over my early aspirations and the wonderful and disappointing course my life had taken over the past two decades, as well as the friends I had lost track of. Merrily struck a very personal chord and I was determined to stage the work. After repeated requests to Sondheim's agent asking permission to do the revised version had been rejected, I nevertheless resolved to move ahead with the original script. As fate would have it, Linda Emond (the actress I was determined would play a leading role in my production) was appearing in a play in Chicago with another actress, Peggy Roeder, who happened to be a close friend of Furth's. Through her, he found out about our plans and, with Peggy as our go-between, inched closer and closer to our first conversation. The Phoenix production had opened and, while George was pleased with the latest re-writes, he decided there was still fine-tuning to be done, and offered to do it with us. As a result, we have agreed to fly him up from his home in Los Angeles to advise on our production.

As I write this, on the evening before rehearsals are to begin, George's arrival is still a week away. The entire production team is looking forward to his input and a rewarding collaboration on this production of *Merrily We Roll Along*.



MOSCOW IN MAY

Find out why last October's concert of the visiting Moscow Virtuosi orchestra was one of the great classical events of recent memory. The concert, part of a Goodwill Games cultural exchange, will air on KING FM on May 20th at 9pm.

Gregory A. Falls, Founding Director

is the founder of ACT and The Young ACT Company. He has directed over 70 productions at ACT in 23 years, including last season's A Lie of the Mind and Biloxi Blues. He has created five original children's theatre revues and three Christmas shows, plus a scripted version of The Odyssey with playwright Kurt Beattie which was selected by Time magazine as one of the Ten Best Plays of 1985. His other original scripts include The Persian Princess, Aladdin and the Magic Lamp, The Forgotten Door, The Pushcart War, Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves and A Wrinkle in Time. For ten years he was Executive Director of the University of Washington School of Drama. He is past president of the National Theatre Conference and the Washington Association of Theatre Artists, a founding board member of the United Arts Council of Puget Sound, and founder of the Champlain Shakespeare Festival.

Jeff Steitzer, *Interim Artistic Director and Director of* Merrily We Roll Along

has directed ACT's productions of The Diary of a Scoundrel. March of the Falsettos, On the Razzle, Tales from Hollywood, The Jail Diary of Albie Sachs, Maydays, Amadeus and Cloud 9. Among the 50-plus productions he has directed locally are The Day They Came From Way Out There, Knuckle, Gossip, Filthy Rich, The Paranormal Review and the Illuminatus! trilogy for The Empty Space; Guys and Dolls for the Palace Theatre; Bay City Blues and Father's Day at The Bathhouse Theatre; and Pinocchio and The Best Christmas Pageant Ever for The Seattle Children's Theatre. Last year he staged the critically-acclaimed American premiere of Red Noses at Chicago's Goodman Theatre. In 1981 he was an NEA Directing Fellow at The Guthrie and in 1982 he served as an NEA Artistic Associate to the Actors Theatre of St. Paul, where he staged We Won't Pay! We Won't Pay! and where his productions of Tartuffe and How the Other Half Loves won Twin Cities Drama Critics KUDOS for Best Direction. Jeff also has directed for the Montana Rep, for Chicago's Wisdom Bridge Theatre, the Berkeley Rep, and elsewhere around the country.

Phil Schermer, Producing Director

has been with the theatre for over 20 years, during which he designed lighting for a great many productions, including Glengarry Glen Ross, On the Razzle, Painting Churches, King Lear, Amadeus, Cloud 9, The Greeks, Loose Ends, Custer, Catholics, Wings, Fashen, The Club, The Water Engine, A Christmas Carol, The Shadow Box, and many more. At The Empty Space he designed lighting for American Buffalo, A Prayer For My Daughter, Heat, and Dulsa, Fish, Stas and Vi. He also designed lighting for The Seattle Repertory Theatre and its Second Stage and sets for ACT, the Second Stage, The Empty Space, and The Bathhouse Theatre.

Susan Trapnell Moritz, Managing Director

is a native of Arlington, Virginia, and moved to Seattle in 1976. She came to ACT in 1982 after four years with Dance Theatre Seattle as Educational Director and then General Manager. Her previous experience has ranged from a stint in Paris as a UNESCO bilingual aide to writing and editing positions in the Washington, D.C. area. She worked with the National Urban League and also taught English in Algeria. Ms. Moritz holds a BA in French from the University of Lyon in France, and has done graduate work in dance education at George Washington University. She is currently President of the Washington State Arts Alliance.

George Furth, Playwright

was born in Chicago and received degrees from Northwestern and Columbia universities. As an actor he has appeared on Broadway, off-Broadway, and in countless films and television shows. As a playwright he won the Tony award for Company, while Sada Thompson won the Tony for his next play Twigs, and Liza Minnelli, the Tony for his musical The Act. He is also the author of The Supporting Cast, which was produced on Broadway in 1981. He has taught drama at the University of Southern California, and is a member of the Actor's Studio.

Stephen Sondheim, Music and Lyrics

wrote the scores for Into the Woods, Merrily We Roll Along, Sweeney Todd, Pacific Overtures, A Little Night Music, The Frogs, Follies, Company, Anyone Can Whistle, and A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, as well as lyrics for West Side Story, Gypsy, and Do I Hear a Waltz? and additional lyrics for Candide. Side by Side by Sondheim and Marry Me a Little are anthologies of his work as composer and lyricist. He composed the film scores for Stravisky and Reds, songs for a television production, Evening Primrose, and co-authored the film The Last of Sheila. He is on the council of the Dramatists Guild, having served as its president from 1973 to 1981, and was elected to the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters in 1983. He received the 1985 Pulitzer Prize for drama in collaboration with James Lapine for Sunday in the Park with George.

Todd Moeller, Music Director

was the music director for ACT's Mainstage productions of Little Shop of Horrors and March of the Falsettos, and the Songworks production of Martin. He also served as accompanist for ACT's Songworks production of Cards, Doctors & Diseases and A Little Bit O'Lehrer. Todd began his career in Seattle with the production of Dames at Sea with the Skid Road Theatre, as an accompanist. From there he went to CTC (now home of the New City Theater) to work on Jacques Brel , and to The Empty Space for the park show Deadwood Dick. Other local musical credits include Stop the World, I Want to Get Off, Leave it to Jane, Paint Your Wagon, Say It With a Song and the Western tour of The Big Broadcast all with The Bathhouse Theatre; and The Caucasian Chalk Circle, Guys and Dolls, Girl Crazy, and Landscape of the Body with The Seattle Repertory Theatre. With local actor Mark Anders, Todd collaborates on writing new works for the musical stage.

Steve Tomkins, Choreographer

returns to ACT, where he choreographed A Christmas Carol last December. His acting credits here include roles in Streamers in 1977 and The Fantastiks in 1979. Some of Steve's other acting credits include appearances in Follies on Broadway in Atlantic City, Solid Gold Follies in Bermuda, and Follies Oo La La in Monte Carlo. He was a company member of The Empty Space for five years, where he appeared in Comedians and American Buffalo, among many others. As a director, Steve has staged productions of The Rocky Horror Show at Portland's Storefront Theatre, and most recently, Gypsy at Issaquah's Village Theatre. His choreography credits include Broadway, The Rocky Horror Show and The Colored Museum at The Empty Space, Do It For the Money and Angry Housewives at Pioneer Square Theater, and West Side Story at the Village Theatre. Steve is currently portraying Wally in PST's long-running Angry Housewives.

Scott Weldin, Set Designer

has designed frequently for ACT. His credits here include *The Diary of a Scoundrel, March of the Falsettos, Tales From Hollywood, End of the World, The Odyssey, The Gin Game, Billy Bishop Goes to War, Getting Out, Buried Child and Artichoke.* Scott holds an M.F.A. in design from the University of Washington and has designed locally for The Seattle Repertory Theatre, Intiman, The Empty Space, The Bathhouse Theatre, and Tacoma Actors Guild. He has also designed scenery for The Goodman Theatre, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, The Oregon Shakespearean Festival and Milwaukee Repertory Theatre. He is currently on the faculties of the University of Washington and Seattle University. Scott is currently working on the set design for ACT's next production, *Mrs. California.*

Rose Pederson, Costume Designer

returns to ACT for her fourth season, where her previous credits include *Glengarry Glen Ross, Brighton Beach Memoirs, Other Places,* and The Young ACT Company's productions of *Theseus and the Minotaur* and *The Odyssey.* Rose's work has also been seen at The Seattle Repertory Theatre's productions of *The Beauty Part, The Understanding,* and *Hunting Cockroaches.* She has also designed costumes for The Rep's New Play Series in the PONCHO Forum and at The Empty Space, The Group Theatre Company, Tacoma Actors Guild, The Bathhouse Theatre, and The Seattle Children's Theatre. She is currently designing costumes for ACT's production of *Mrs. California.*

Jennifer Lupton, Lighting Designer

returns to ACT where she designed lights for last season's The Marriage of Bette and Boo. Previously she designed lights for The Young ACT Company's The Odyssey and the set for A Wrinkle in Time. Other recent lighting credits include Blue Window at New City Theater, The Hunchback of Notre Dame and James and the Giant Peach (for which she also designed the sets) at The Seattle Children's Theatre and Idioglossia with The Group Theatre Company. Jennifer also designs sets for many theatres including Intiman, The Group Theatre Company, Tacoma Actors Guild, SCT, Perseverance Theatre in Juneau, the Alaska Rep in Anchorage and The Empty Space. Currently she is working on the lighting design for Intiman's production of Hard Times.

Ten Eyck Swackhamer, Stage Manager

is a newcomer to ACT. Along with his two best friends, Leslie and Ebenezer La Page, Ten Eyck moved to Seattle last summer and they all agree it's a wonderful place to live. He has worked at The Empty Space, Los Angeles Theatre Center, La Mama, and has done something for almost every theatre in Washington, D.C. Ten Eyck is also a playwright and hopes to have *The Lair's Club* or *College Daze* produced in the fall.

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
