ACT's Art in the Lobby Curator, Pamela Powers, is pleased to present works by Martha Scannell during the run of *Shadowlands*.

Originally from Lansing, Michigan, Scannell enrolled in Michigan State University and subsequently earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago. She has been exhibiting works in oil, watercolor and gouache since 1982.

While working on the East Coast, Scannell exhibited her work at The Provincetown Art Association and Art Museum, and became a charter member of the Cape Cod Museum of Fine Arts. In this area, she has shown her paintings at the Bellevue Art Museum, where she won the Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Fisher Award from the Northwest Watercolor

Society. She has also participated in invitational and iuried exhibitions throughout the Northwest, including shows at the Frye Art Museum in Seattle. Western

Washington University's Viking Union Gallery and the Northwest Annual Exhibit at the Bellingham Museum of History and Art. A charter member of the Allied Arts of Whatcom County, Scannell was commissioned by Nordstrom for six paintings to hang in their Los Angeles store. This September, the Bellingham Allied Arts will host a one-woman show of her paintings.

Scannell, experienced in museum research and cataloguing, enjoys various forms of visual art, including painting, printmaking, film and video. Her exhibit at ACT consists of paintings in gouache and reflects scenes of both Cape Cod and the Pacific Northwest.

The third annual ACT Abroad Theatre Tour will include four nights in Dublin to coincide with the 1992 Dublin Theatre Festival, which runs October 7 - 19. The group will head to London on October 7 and spend seven nights attending the theatre and other related activities before flying to Dublin for the final few days of the Dublin Festival.

The package will include:

- Round trip airfare, Seattle-London-Dublin.
- Eight plays including four in London, one in Stratford and three in Dublin.

- Seven nights at the Waldorf Hotel, London, and four nights at the Mont Clare Hotel, Dublin.

An Adventure into Another World

George Sayer was a close friend of C.S. Lewis and his biography, Jack, C.S. Lewis and His Times, is published by Macmillan. The following is adapted from Sayer's remarks published for a 1990 production at The Queens Theatre in London.

Lewis, one of the most important serious writers of the twentieth century, was born in Belfast on November 29, 1898. His father, an attorney, was a Welshman, "sentimental, passionate... easily moved to anger and tenderness." His mother came of a cooler race, critical and ironic. He felt closer to his mother and, like her, distrusted strong emotion.

His was a happy childhood. He had a garden in which to play, loving parents and an intimate relationship with his brother, Warren ("Warnie"), whom he also regarded as his best friend. At the age of four he showed his independence of his parents by rejecting Clive Staples, the names they had chosen, and insisting on being called "Jacksie," soon shortened to "Jack." The great theme of most of his mature writing is love, yet he experienced many years of lovelessness. This began with the death of his mother and was followed at once by his banishment, as it seemed to him, to a cruel and tyrannical prep school. The rest of his education was loveless, too; as inevitably were his experiences in the Great War in which he served as a volunteer and was twice wounded.

Lewis obtained a scholarship to Oxford and was brilliantly successful academically. It is significant that in the midst of his early academic career he found time to publish two books of verse which show a craving for love and the feminine. Both were of a kind of poetry already unfashionable and were commercial flops.

He became a Fellow and Tutor of Magdalen College in 1925. Ten years later, Lewis seemed to be as confirmed a bachelor as any in Oxford. His friends were all men and his social habits were masculine. He had hardly any women pupils. He was known to have asked to be relieved of one or two of the few

who came his way, especially if they were at all attractive. It was not dislike that caused him to behave in this way, but the fear of the ways in which feminine charm, if he gave way to it, would overturn the set pattern of his bachelor life. Yet the first of his two great academic masterpieces was on the theme of love. *The Allegory of Love* chronicles a revolution in feeling

ordinary educated people. Over fifty years later, this pioneer work still remains the best book on the subject. The theme of love is also important in his magnificent *English Literature in the Sixteenth Century* published in 1954, but there is much else. His enthusiasm for writers such as Sidney Spenser and, say, Calvin, is infectious. You have to be a stolid writer not to be carried away.

Lewis' years in pre-war Oxford were also years of spiritual development. When he entered the University, he thought of himself as a sort of atheist. He moved through pantheism and Hegelian idealism to a belief in God or at least belief in a supreme being. He became a practicing member of the Church of England in 1931, although it was some time before he felt he knew enough about the Christian doctrine to try to pass on his faith to other people. He went on living the quiet

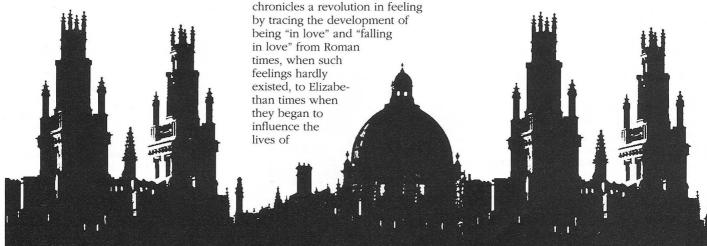
unadventurous life of a somewhat eccentric bachelor don, hardly known outside academic circles.

Early in 1951 he was invited by the BBC to give a series of talks on right and wrong. These were a tremendous success, perhaps because his reasonable yet

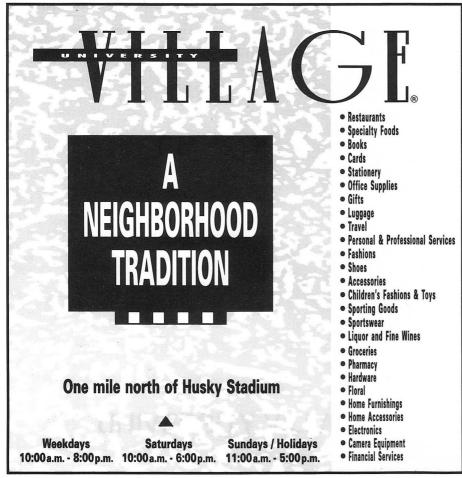
perhaps because his reasonable yet authoritarian manner provided just the reassurance that many needed. Other series of talks followed. When the collection was published in book form as *Mere Christianity*, it was recognized as the best simple rational presentation of Christian belief and one acceptable to people of every church. It is still a world best-seller. Lewis gave away all royalties from this and his other religious books to charities or individuals in need.

The Screwtape Letters, a brilliant series of letters from one devil to another that

was published in 1942, uses war as its background. A shrewd and witty study of evil, it was an immediate success. It remains the most popular of all C.S. Lewis books, and has been translated into every major language. Yet he often said that it was the one he least enjoyed writing, because it aroused feelings dangerous to his mental health.

Lewis' children's stories, the books by which he is now best known, were also written to fill a need. During the war children were billeted at The Kilns, his house outside Oxford. He was surprised by how little they read and by the unimaginative quality of most of the children's stories then available. He conceived the idea of writing a story himself that was to be an adventure into another world, one entered through a wardrobe, with a mythological theme that resembled some parts of the Christian story. The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe was an astonishing success when it appeared in 1950 and, with six stories that followed, is now an assured children's classic of worldwide appeal. The central character, Aslan, is in its way Jack's supreme achievement, a divine figure who is majestic and awesome and vet so tender and loving that children can embrace him without fear.

The wide popularity of these books meant Lewis received many letters, usually expressing appreciation, but quite often asking for advice or raising questions of doctrine. If he thought he could help, he answered such letters personally and at length, writing in longhand with the old-fashioned dip-pen that he always used. It was a formidable correspondence. His reward for undertaking it was the introduction it gave him to Joy Davidman who "stood out ... by her amusing and well-written letters."

Joy's gift to Jack was his personal fulfillment, the end of his lifelong search for love. But she also helped him to write two important books. Both are about the different sorts of love. She assisted him with the novel that became *Till We Have Faces* at a time when he dried up, suffering from "writer's block." Her influence is everywhere, even in the style. He sometimes said that it was his best novel. Many agree. He could not have written the other book, *The Four Loves*, without the experience of love that she gave him.

It is without doubt that Jack Lewis has, over the years, helped many thousands of people to better understand themselves in their search for the truth about love.

ACT is proud to present the American premiere of *The Revengers' Comedies*, a fiendishly clever two-part comic thriller by England's foremost living playwright. The creator of over 40 plays, Ayckbourn is best known to ACT audiences for *Woman in Mind, A Chorus of Disapproval, Absurd Person Singular* and *Relatively Speaking*.

Ayckbourn borrows from Alfred Hitchcock's classic film, *Strangers on a Train*, to set this wickedly funny plot in motion. Two desperate people meet on a bridge and accidentally save each other's lives. Karen is young, wealthy and dramatic, in contrast to Henry, a lethargic man in mid-life crisis, abandoned by his unfaithful wife and fired by an equally disloyal employer. One convinces the other that the only reason to go on living is to wreak havoc on the people who drove them to despair. In order to avoid detection, they *swap* revenges. Karen, with no marketable skills whatsoever, blazes her way into Henry's corporate lifestyle, while Henry copes with the eccentrics on a country estate and the unknowing victim of Karen's wrath.

The resulting chaos, suspense and laughter spill over into two performances. A cast of 14 actors playing multiple roles features R. Hamilton Wright, Laurence Ballard, Jeanne Paulsen, Katie Forgette, Peter Silbert and Suzanne Bouchard.

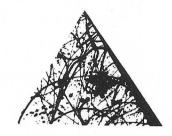
