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Creating a space for Black boys to **become Black men** is the gargantuan task Headmaster Marrow, the leader of a prestigious all Black, all male boarding school, is tasked with. In a time when both of those groups are threatened. and their safety anything but guaranteed, the story you are about to watch offers up a vision of how to create that reality. Time and time again, when we are challenged by the biggest questions of our time, we've turned to artists. We have to look no further than the brilliant and award-winning Tarell Alvin McCraney to gain some insight into this pressing issue—where is it safe to be a Black child?

This play presents the idea that in curating spaces where Black boys can be soft with one another, we can provide opportunities for them to break free of the labels and perceptions that infringe on their lives the most. Studies show that Black children are perceived to look less

child-like and are most likely to be seen as older than their actual age. Aging up children can have huge consequences - look no further than the sordid history of how this country has treated young Black boys from Till, Trayvon, and Tamir.

In the soft spaces we create for these children, they will find that they are more than what the media portrays them to be. They can see that the layers of artifice they've been forced to wear to be perceived as less than a threat do not actually keep them safe, but rather, provide a temporary shield for others. The arm's length relationship that others have with the true hearts and minds of Black boys only continues to "other" them and perpetuates a vicious cycle even if it is done unconsciously.

Of course, this issue is of personal importance to me. I'll assume, by your presence here, you also have questions about this topic. If you and I share a similar background. I invite you to shed that artifice and enjoy what can be possible if we love and accept all of the ways in which Black boys want to experience the world. If you and I were raised differently, I ask that you take this opportunity to not be a voyeur, but to respect that you've been dropped into an intimate space. Respect the privilege to bear witness, engage with all of your senses, and lean in. As you leave the theater, I hope you engage in conversations that lead to towards something better. The future of my kids depend on it.

OUR 10TH UNIQUE AND EXCITING COLLABORATION

The show you are about to watch is the result of 10 seasons of exceptional partnership between ACT - A Contemporary Theatre and The 5th Avenue Theatre. We couldn't be more thrilled that *Choir Boy*—a unique, powerful production that expands how music, movement, and drama come together to create musical storytelling—is taking its place in our collaborative canon.

In 2009, our organizations came together and discussed how it would be exciting to produce smaller-scale musicals, ones that would thrill ACT audiences but wouldn't necessarily be appropriate in The 5th's 2,000-seat venue, and would be challenging to produce in Seattle otherwise. This venture has become a way for both organizations to be adventurous in producing musical theater and highlight our amazing local talent for up to 10 week runs, all while fulfilling important aspects of our respective artistic missions.

For our partnership, this production is breaking new ground. Up until now, we'd only considered more traditional musicals: that is, shows that were either entirely sung, or employed a book to get from one musical number to another. Though it provides all the joy and open-hearted emotion we love about musicals, *Choir Boy* utilizes a different form for how music is used to uplift and explode open the emotion of the story being told. The songs live in the world as songs, not fantasy or rhythmic musical dialogue. This opens a whole new library of possibilities, and we are delighted to dream about what's next, as both our institutions are eager to explore the space of creators, not just interpreters.

On a more personal note: it has been a comfort and strength for both of our institutions to support one another through mutual investment in this partnership, one that has allowed us to lean on each other through the headwinds of the last few challenging years and we could think of no better leader to join forces with on our first co-production back than director Jamil Jude. We strongly believe our collaboration and innovative storytelling is integral to the evolution and expansion of the art form, and is vital to the future of both theaters. We can't wait to see where we go in the years ahead.

The Public Theater in New York, Steppenwolf Theatre in Chicago, at a trio of theaters in the Bay Area: Marin Theatre Company, ACT, and Magic Theatre, as well as the Young Vic in London (Olivier Award nomination) and around the world. Other plays include The Breach (Southern Rep), Wig Out! (Sundance Theatre Institute, Royal Court, and Vineyard Theatre - GLAAD Award for Outstanding Play), and American Trade (Royal Shakespeare Company and Hampstead Theatre). Steppenwolf Theatre Company, where he is an ensemble member, will produce the world premiere of his commissioned play, Head of Passes. Tarell was the Royal Shakespeare Company's International Playwright in Residence in 2008-2010, where he co-edited and directed the Young People's Shakespeare production of *Hamlet* which toured throughout the UK and was presented at the Park Avenue Armory in New York. He is the recipient of the prestigious Whiting Award and Steinberg Playwright Award, as well as London's Evening Standard Award for Most Promising Playwright, the inaugural New York Times Outstanding Playwright Award, and the inaugural Paula Vogel Playwriting Award. He is a graduate from the New World School of the Arts High School, the Theatre School at DePaul University in Chicago, and the Yale School of Drama. He is a resident playwright at New Dramatists and a member of Teo Castellanos/D-Projects in Miami.

JAMIL JUDE (Director) (he/him) is a highly accomplished director, playwright, and dramaturg focusing on bringing socially relevant art to the community. Jamil is the Artistic Director at Kenny Leon's True Colors Theatre Company in Atlanta, Georgia, where he previously served as Associate Artistic Director. He co-founded The New Griots Festival, which is dedicated to celebrating, advocating, and advancing the careers of emerging Black artists in the greater Minneapolis-St. Paul metro area in Minnesota. Before joining True Colors, Jamil served as the Artistic Programming Associate at Park Square Theatre, a Producer in Residence at Mixed Blood Theatre, a New Play Producing Fellow at Arena Stage, and co-founded the Colored People's Theatre. Among his many awards, Jamil has received the Captain of Industry Award (21/22), Turn The Spotlight Fellowship (18/19), Andrew W. Mellon/TCG Leadership U Fellowship (2015/17), Nautilus Music Theater Management Fellowship (2014/15), NNPN Producer Residency (2011/12, 2012/13), Jerome Foundation/The Playwrights' Center Many Voices Mentorship (2013/14), and the Allen Lee Hughes

Fellowship at Arena Stage (2009/10, 2010/11). Jamil received his Bachelors of Arts from Colgate University.

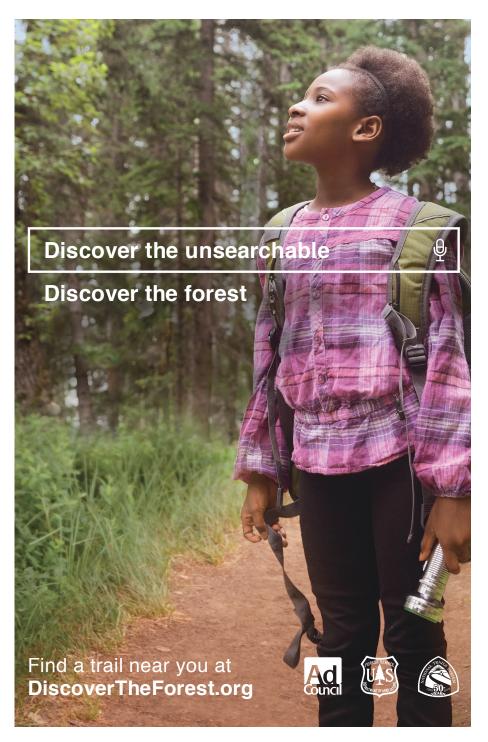

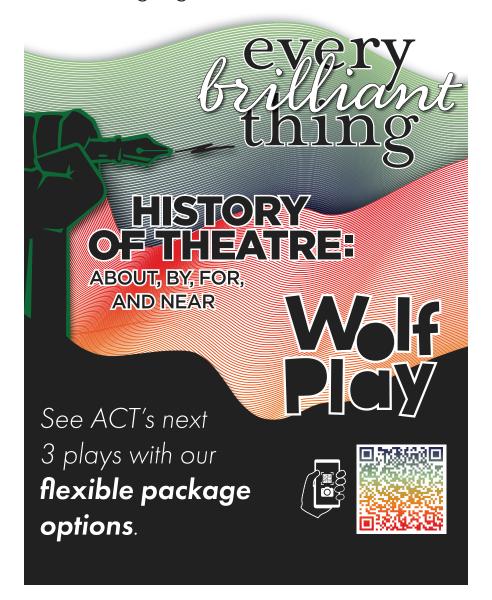

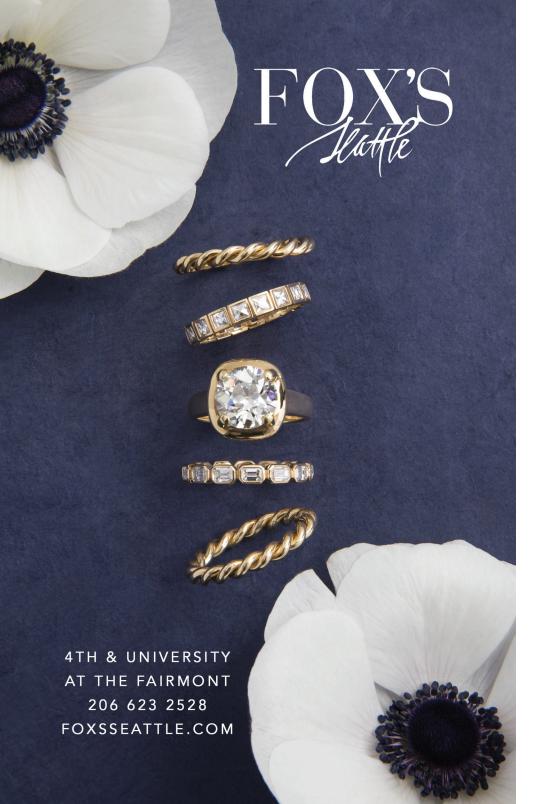
