A Letter from the Director and Artistic Director JOHN LANGS

My introduction to this play occurred in an ordinary way – a text message from a Core Company member and longtime colleague. The text read:

"To see one another fully and to be fully seen is an act of courage and faith."

"I've just seen something very beautiful I think you should investigate."

Receiving messages like this is one of the great pleasures of this work, so, of course, I took the bait. Just hearing the title *A Case for the Existence of God*, I had so many expectations about what the argument at the center of this play could be. Science vs. Faith. Nurture vs. Nature. Agnostics vs. Religion. Like a great set-up, all these expectations were upended upon my first read.

Samuel D. Hunter, whose works describe people going about their modern lives in Idaho, has always subverted audience expectations. He has become a true chronicler of our time by amplifying the existential questions that have become more complex as our society continues to move at the speed of light, bombarding us with an overload of information and expectations.

After my first read, which was a deeply moving experience, someone asked me what the play was about. The phrase that came to mind was "adulting in the age of anxiety." For me, the story resonated with the question of how our humanity must navigate the complicated systems and stage gates of being an adult living in a capitalist system. These systems that were set in motion by pioneers and captains of industry like the Lehman brothers who you will meet at the end of this season. These systems continue to affect our lives, the lives of Ryan and Keith, who you will meet today, and the women of *STEW*, who will take the stage in our next production in March.

While we can argue about the effects of capitalism, it's hard to debate the fact that you either participate in the process or get left behind. The human expense of survival in a modern world is real. The stakes go sky high when we try to make the world better for those in our care than it has been for us. On this journey, sometimes the only balm offered is our ability to connect to our fellow passengers. To see one another fully and to be fully seen is an act of courage and faith. I am deeply grateful for the artists in the world who have the faith and courage to reaffirm this case.

Thank you for being here.

As we start the second half of our season, what I am most thrilled about are the abundant audiences, both new and returning, coming to the theatre! Langs received his directing degree from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts. Some of his favorite directing credits include The Shaggs Philosophy of the World (Los Angeles Drama Critic Circle Award for Best Original Musical), Brothers Karamazov (seven LADCC Awards including Best Production of the year and Best Direction), and directing Kurt Beattie in King Lear. Langs received the first annual Seattle Gregory Award honoring excellence in direction for The Adding Machine. As a dedicated fan of original work, Langs has shepherded over a dozen projects to their premiere production.

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A Conversation with Yussef El Guindi and John Langs

As ACT continues its mission of creating bold new works, we wanted to check in with our Core Company member Yussef El Guindi. We are proud to be the company Yussef calls home and are thrilled to celebrate his success. ACT's Artistic Director John Langs sat down with Yussef El Guindi in January to talk about Yussef's career and his time with ACT.

John: Would you share how ACT has played a role in your journey as a playwright?

Yussef: When you stepped into the role as Artistic Director, I wasn't sure what to expect, since usually when someone new comes in, they want to bring their own writers, but you invited me to be part of the Core Company after our first meeting.

I can truly say that being at ACT furthered my career. I had achieved some prominence nationally with some of my other productions, but ACT took me to the next level. It was very important for me to have a theatre, especially a local theater, that was open to my work. You can only sustain "I love writing" up to a certain point. You need to know someone will catch the play when you put it out into the world.

Part of the journey of every playwright is finding the right platform to showcase your work. A couple of smaller theaters around the country, and locally, had been instrumental in giving me the confidence to keep going. But ACT was the first big LORT theatre to take an interest in my plays. Having ACT say "We want you and your voice" turbocharged my output. The material began to pour out. Having ACT in my corner is important for me psychologically because I know there's at least one theatre that is open to considering my work.

John: Collaboration has always been a strong point in your work. Can you share a memorable collaboration experience you had with our team at ACT?

Yussef: Writing can be an isolating task. With novels and short stories it's just you, and later the editor. With screenplays, it sometimes happens that the script is taken off your hands and other people come in to continue its journey. It's essentially just a blueprint, a starting off point. You give it up and someone

else builds the house.

On the other hand, a play *is* the house. You've built the essential structure. Which allows others to now enter and be a part of the building process. It comes to life in the hands of costume designers, actors, composers, set designers, directors, lighting technicians, and others.

One of the most exciting moments of each production for me is that first design meeting—seeing the sets and ideas presented that will animate the play. I remember when we were in production for *Hotter Than Egypt*, I saw "the head" (see below) come down on the set, with the lighting and music attending its descent, and I just thought "wow." It was more than I had hoped for.

The next big thing for Yussef is taking People of the Book

to New York City to play Off-Broadway this fall with our own John Langs once again at the helm as director. Yussef and John are both eager to build the show at Urban Stages and are excited to present this masterful work to New York audiences.

We look forward to future collaborations with Yussef at ACT Contemporary Theatre!
